Hispanic Heritage Month celebrated

Hispanic Heritage Month in Western New York kicked off Thursday in the Buffalo & Erie County Central Library downtown with a performance tour taking attendees around the world.

The band Grupo Variedad took the audience on a musical journey to Colombia with a cumbia selection and then to Cuba with the sounds of the cha-cha.

Students from a fourth-grade bilingual class at Frank A. Sedita School 30 performed several songs, including "The Girl From Ipanema," a Brazilian favorite. Youngsters Yaiza Cirino, Destiny Pagan, Damiliz Parilla, Marian Rivas and Samuel Moldanado played the bells to the rendition.

And teenage dancers Betzabel Medina and Jesenia Gonzalez treated the audience to a bomba performance. Rooted in African tradition, the bomba features dancers moving to the rhythm of

floor drums. The art form was created by African slaves in Puerto Rico as an outlet.

"They forgot about slavery when they danced [the bomba]," Gonzalez said.

Hispanic Heritage Month recognizes the contributions of Hispanic Americans in the United States and celebrates their legacy and culture.

Dozens of people attended the noon ceremony Thursday to kick off the monthlong celebration, including community leaders, Erie County Executive Chris Collins, Buffalo Mayor Byron W. Brown and a representative from Gov. Andrew M. Cuomo's office.

Gilbert Melendez, an honor student at Hutchinson-Central Technical High School, recited the Pledge of Allegiance in Spanish and English.

The local celebration coincides with the national observance that concludes Oct. 15 and was organized by the Hispanic Heritage Council of WNY, which is about a

year old.

Activities taking place include a logo contest for students in Buffalo Public Schools to design a symbol or emblem to represent the Hispanic Heritage Council of WNY. The winner will be recognized at a Hispanic heritage program Oct. 14 at School 30.

The national observance began in 1968 as Hispanic Heritage Week under President Lyndon B. Johnson and was expanded by President Ronald Reagan in 1988 to cover a 30-day period starting Sept. 15, a special day in five Latin American countries.

It marks the anniversary of the independence of Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua from Spain in 1821.
